1 What is Canada LIFTs, and how is it different from FIT and Spur Change?

Canada LIFTs is a new multi-stream **funding and learning program** designed to support transformative, community-led international cooperation by Canadian small and medium-sized organizations (SMOs) and their partners.

2 What are the different funding streams under Canada LIFTs, and when will they open?

Canada LIFTs funding streams are being launched in phases: Additional intakes for each of the above streams announced on a regular basis.

3 What is the registration process, and what are the application deadlines?

For the Canada LIFTs Catalyst Fund:

Organizations must complete a **registration form by March 30, 2026**.

Registered organizations will be invited to apply on April 1, 2026.

Applications must be submitted by April 30, 2026.

4 If we apply to the Catalyst Fund, does that affect our eligibility for other Canada LIFTs streams?

No. Applying to (or receiving) Catalyst funding does not prevent you from applying to other Canada LIFTs streams in the future.

However, organizations are limited to **one active Canada LIFTs project at a time**.

5 Who is eligible to apply as a Canadian SMO under Canada LIFTs?

To apply, an organization must:

Be a **Canadian registered charity or non-profit, registered federally or provincially**

Have consolidated annual revenue of **\$10 million or less**

Have annual overseas development assistance expenditures of **\$2 million or less**

Be incorporated in Canada for at least **three years**

Provide three years of financial statements (audited preferred, not required)

Demonstrate financial, ethical, and operational capacity to manage funds responsibly

You are not eligible if:

- you are a post-secondary institution or affiliated (meaning your registration number is the same as the university)

-you are a for profit entity

-you are receiving funding from Global Affairs Canada (GAC)

6 What learning supports, communities of practice, webinars, or accompaniment opportunities are available?

Canada LIFTs goes beyond funding and includes:

- Learning resources
- Peer connection
- Communities of practice
- Webinars
- Accompaniment and technical support (stream-dependent)

The [February 18, 2026 launch webinar](#) provided an overview of program design, and additional learning sessions are expected.

7 Are diaspora-led, Indigenous, or First Nations–led organizations eligible?

Yes. Diaspora-led, Indigenous, and First Nations–led organizations are encouraged to apply, provided they meet the general Canadian SMO eligibility criteria.

8 What reporting and MEL (Monitoring, Evaluation, and Learning) requirements apply to funded projects?

The Canada LIFTs Program is in development. We expect that reporting requirements will be designed to be:

- Proportionate to the amount/size of funding
- Learning-focused
- Primarily narrative in nature
- Supported by a limited set of common indicators

9 Can organizations submit multiple applications or hold multiple active Canada LIFTs grants?

Organizations are only permitted to submit **one application per stream per intake**.

Organizations may apply to other streams and intakes over time but may hold **only one active Canada LIFTs funded project at a time**.

10 Can non-Canadian organizations apply directly, and under what conditions?

Lead applicants must meet Canadian SMO eligibility requirements.

Non-Canadian organizations are key partners for all international projects.

11 Is matching funding required?

Matching requirements vary by stream:

- **Canada LIFTs Catalyst Fund:** No matching required
- **Canada LIFTs Momentum Fund:** 5% matching required
- **Canada LIFTs Together Fund:** 1:1 (100%) matching required eg. If SMO contributes 200,000 Canada LIFTs will contribute \$200,000 for a \$400,000 project.

12 How much funding can organizations request under the Canada LIFTs Catalyst Fund, and for how long?

Under the Canada LIFTs Catalyst Fund, organizations may request:

- **\$10,000–\$50,000 per year**
- For **1–3 years**
- Up to a maximum total of **\$150,000**

Renewal is possible but not guaranteed annually, up to the stream maximum.

13 Can funds be used for public engagement activities in Canada?

Yes. Public engagement activities in Canada are eligible and may form part of — or in some cases the primary focus of — a Canada LIFTs project.

14 What are the expectations regarding gender equality, inclusion, ethics, and Do No Harm?

All projects must:

- Support **equal opportunities for people of all genders** and make sure everyone feels included.
- Recognize and address **unfair power dynamics and barriers** that prevent some people from participating fully.
- Follow a strong **Do No Harm approach**, making sure actions do not cause unintended harm to people or communities.
- Respect **environmental protection, ethical practices, and human rights** in all activities.

These principles are **key factors used by Canada LIFTs when evaluating projects**.

15 How does Canada LIFTs define and assess localization and power-sharing with partners?

- Projects should be **designed with partners and informed by the needs and knowledge of the community**.
- **Decisions and leadership should be shared** among partners.
- Everyone involved should have clear roles and responsibilities.
- **Community members should be meaningfully involved** in the project.
- Partnerships should be **fair, with shared resources and balanced relationships**.

Canada LIFTs looks at **how well applications explain and put these ideas into practice** when assessing localization and power-sharing.

This includes looking at:

- **Localization** — whether local organizations and communities have real leadership and decision-making roles.
- **Power-sharing** — whether partners share decisions, resources, and responsibilities fairly.

16 What thematic areas or types of projects are eligible for funding?

All Canada LIFTs projects should have an overarching goal of poverty eradication or reduction and the promotion or advancement of gender equality, which can be done in many ways.

Canada LIFTs is therefore not limited to specific thematic areas or project type. We are interested in understanding what the community priorities are. Eligible projects may include (but are not limited to):

- ▶ Gender equality
- ▶ Climate and environment
- ▶ Education
- ▶ Health
- ▶ Governance
- ▶ Public engagement

Projects must align with Canada LIFTs values, including community-centred approaches, localization, equity, and ethical practice.

17 Is there a concept note stage, or is the application fully application-based?

There is no concept note stage for the Canada LIFTs Catalyst Fund. The process includes registration followed by a full application.

18 Are post-secondary institutions or university-affiliated organizations eligible?

Universities and colleges are not eligible as lead applicants.

University-affiliated organizations may be eligible if they independently meet Canadian SMO eligibility requirements.

19 Are environmental, climate-related, construction, or renovation projects eligible?

Environmental and climate-related projects are eligible.

Construction or renovation eligibility depends on the stream:

Under the **Canada LIFTs Catalyst Fund**, construction and refurbishment projects are not eligible.

Other streams (Momentum or Together) may permit construction, subject to stream-specific parameters.

20 Are there specific project country requirements?

Yes. All Canada LIFTs projects (excluding public engagement-only projects based in Canada) must be undertaken in ODA (Overseas Development Assistance) eligible countries: [ODA recipients: countries, territories, and international organisations | OECD](#)

21 Please clarify the definition of overseas expenditures.

Expenses incurred in Canada—such as headquarters salaries, administrative support, and overhead—are not considered direct overseas program costs.

However, in practice many NGOs/SMOs include these expenses in their financial statements as part of overall program costs because they are integral to delivering and supporting the overseas programs. Activities such as program management, financial oversight, monitoring, and administrative coordination often occur in Canada but are essential to the implementation of the programs abroad.

As a result, while they may not be direct in-country expenditures, these costs are frequently reported as program-related expenses since they directly support program delivery.

22 Will there be webinars to support the application process?

If you have registered to apply for a fund, you will be emailed with information regarding a webinar to support the application process once the application process for that fund has been opened. You must register to attend this webinar. All those who register for the webinar will also have access to the recording of the webinar.

23 Will there be webinars for each funding stream and call?

Yes, webinars will be planned for each funding stream and call. Details for these will be announced on the Canada LIFTs webpage, across all of the Inter-Council Network social media, including the social media accounts of each of the Councils, as well as emailed to all those who have registered in [the FLUXX system](#). The webinars will be recorded and saved on the [Canada LIFTs website](#).

24 What is the difference between an international partner and a local partner? Are these two different groups / organizations?

The terms ‘international partner’ and ‘local partner’ are used throughout the application and our resources. They refer to the same organization: the international partner that is locally based in the country where the project will be implemented.

25 What is a PSEAH?

This refers to a policy on protection against sexual exploitation, abuse, and harassment (PSEAH). All organizations and partners will be required to have one in place before the start of the project. Resources to support the development of these policies will be provided as needed.

26 It was stated that projects must ‘propose activities in countries eligible for ODA (or focus on eligible public engagement in Canada)’. Could you confirm whether this wording means that it would be possible to carry out a project entirely in Canada?

All projects under the Canada LIFT program (with the exception of projects exclusively focused on public engagement in Canada) must be implemented in countries eligible for Official Development Assistance (ODA): [ODA recipients: countries, territories, and international organizations](#).

Funding for activities in Canada is limited to public engagement.

**27 For streams with matching contributions:
Is there a specific percentage to be respected between cash and in-kind contributions?**

We do not have a specific percentage for cash or in-kind contributions. This depends on your project and how you present it. However, we will require confirmation of both cash and in-kind contributions.

28 If our organization becomes a recipient of the LIFT program, could this limit or prevent future access to other Global Affairs Canada funding mechanisms, including unsolicited proposals or other funding streams?

While we cannot respond on behalf of Global Affairs Canada, we do not believe that this would limit or prevent your access to Global Affairs Canada funding through a call for proposals or an unsolicited proposal initiative.

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
